

Comisión Investigadora Internacional (2005) de Crímenes contra la Humanidad perpetrados por el gobierno de George W. Bush de Estados Unidos

Ante la posibilidad de que se hayan cometido grandes crímenes de guerra y crímenes contra la humanidad, corresponde a las personas de conciencia investigar el alcance de dichos actos, y determinar si de hecho son crímenes de ese nivel. Con tal propósito se convoca la Comisión Investigadora Internacional de Crímenes contra la Humanidad. El Tribunal, programado para octubre, se encargará de recabar pruebas, examinarlas con todo rigor y determinar si George W. Bush y su gobierno han cometido crímenes contra la humanidad. Se guiarán las normas establecidas del derecho internacional, sin limitarse por ellas.

El Tribunal evaluará cuatro clases de crímenes:

- 1) Guerras de agresión, particularmente la invasión y ocupación de Irak y Afganistán;
- 2) Tortura y detenciones indefinidas, particularmente el desacato a las normas internacionales sobre la tortura y el tratamiento de prisioneros de guerra;
- 3) Destrucción del ambiente global, particularmente una serie de medidas que llevan al calentamiento global con consecuencias catastróficas;
- 4) Ataques contra los derechos reproductivos y la salud pública internacional, particularmente las consecuencias genocidas de imponer a los organismos de salud internacionales la orden de promover "abstinencia sexual" en medio de la epidemia mundial del SIDA.

Integrarán el jurado de conciencia de la Comisión juristas de renombre internacional, destacados luchadores sociales, y expertos y observadores de diversas ramas. Su legitimidad se deriva de su integridad, el rigor en la presentación de las pruebas y la talla moral de los participantes. Invitará a representantes de la administración de Bush a presentar la defensa.

Equipos de expertos con competencia en varios campos formularán acusaciones preliminares para los distintos crímenes y especificarán el alcance de las acciones de la administración de Bush en contravención de las normas jurídicas y morales internacionales. Cuatro equipos presentarán las pruebas al Tribunal a través de documentos y testimonio presencial de víctimas y observadores de los crímenes en cuestión. El Tribunal se celebrará en un lugar público y se hará el máximo esfuerzo por divulgar y transmitir las sesiones en el plano internacional. Emitirá veredictos y publicará sus conclusiones.

El Tribunal sentará las bases para una discusión que urge en Estados Unidos: ¿es la administración de George W. Bush culpable de crímenes de guerra y crímenes contra la humanidad? Desempeñará su labor partiendo de un profundo compromiso con los pueblos del mundo.
